Our Opportunity.

Located in the London Borough of Croydon, The BRIT School is the leading Performing and Creative Arts school in the UK providing a unique education for over 1,300 pupils aged between 14 and 19 in the fields of music, film, digital design, community arts, production and performing arts as well as a full academic programme of GCSEs and A Levels. For over a quarter of a century, The BRIT School has successfully nurtured creative skills in students from every type of background alongside a robust and full academic curriculum.

Climate change requires rapid and urgent action across all sectors of society to address the current climate and ecological emergency if we are to limit global warming to 1.5 degrees.
